6.	Read Psalm 32. Which verses in this psalm can you identify with the most?
7.	Close your time together in prayer, thanking God for the different ways he has showered his

generous patience on you in the past week.



Unexpected: Permissive!?! The Absolute Absurdity of God's Patience Matthew 21:33-46

Introduction: Jesus' parable is a powerful call to repentance.

 God is the o of everything we possess (Psalm 24:1).
Can you identify with the tenants in the vineyard?
The farmers were acting s, claiming everything as their own.
Note the landowner's response. He keeps trying to win them back.
• "Last of all, he sent his son to them" (v. 37). Absurd!
What father would send his son to such hateful and cruel tenants?
• The absurdity is i, for it is a picture of God's grace, mercy, and love (Romans 5:8).
This parable is the most strongly worded w Jesus can issue.
We cannot pull the w over God's eyes (Galatians 6:7).
 Confessing our sins before God, he invites us to find r in Jesus (1 John 1:7).
Jesus is the c of God's Church, and he provides purpose and direction in our lives
• Jesus is the One by whom all people with either s or f on the Day of Judgment (Luke 2:34, 35).
We shake our heads in amazement at the p love of our heavenly Father.
Conclusion: God permissive? No. God patient, persistent, persevering? Yes.
